Eve Hill is Senior Vice President of the Burton Blatt Institute of Syracuse University. She is responsible for the Institute's work on Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), disability civil rights, and communications issues. Ms. Hill has been a disability rights attorney for over 15 years.

Ms. Hill has enforced disability civil rights laws in the state government, federal government, and private nonprofit sectors. She was the District of Columbia's first Director of the Office of Disability Rights, responsible for implementation of the ADA throughout District Government. She served as Executive Director of the Disability Rights Legal Center, a leading nonprofit disability advocacy group in Los Angeles, where she focused on ADA litigation, special education advocacy, and mediation of disability rights cases. She was a Supervisory Attorney with the U.S. Department of Justice's Disability Rights Section, where she supervised ADA investigations, created the Department's ADA Mediation Program, and developed the Department's ADA building code certification program. She was also a Visiting Associate Professor at Loyola Law School and an Adjunct Professor at the University of Southern California School of Law and Loyola Marymount University.

Ms. Hill is co-author of "Disability Civil Rights Law and Policy," as a case book and a treatise. She received the 2007 Distinguished Service Award from the Women Lawyers Association of Los Angeles, was a 2006 Durfee Foundation Stanton Fellow, and won the 2002 State Bar of California Diversity Award. Ms. Hill has been recognized as one of the top 3,000 plaintiffs' lawyers in the US and one of the top 5 percent of lawyers in Los Angeles County. A native of Maine, Ms. Hill received her J.D., cum laude, from Cornell Law School and her B.A., magna cum laude, from Sweet Briar College.
