RESTAURANTS

South Beach

(this is a partial listing of all the restaurants in South Beach area)

Joe's Stone Crab

(11 Washington Ave, Miami Beach, FL 33139)

This is Miami's most famous restaurant and home of the curious crustacean know as the Stone Crab. Joe's can be difficult to get in without a connection (no reservations) so go with your favorite Miami host. Or, you could try going early (6pm) or late (10pm). Joe's is also open for lunch.

Shoji & Shoji Sushi

(100 Collins Ave, Miami Beach, FL 33139)

This is the best sushi on Miami Beach. For cooked food, don't miss the black cod misoyaki, eel sushi, ceviches, and hagashi (when available).

Hakasaan

(Fountainebleau)

The cocktails (try the Chinese Mule), duck and lobster dishes are fantastic.

Cecconi's Miami Beach

(4385 Collins Avenue, Miami Beach, FL 33140)

Situated in the Ground Floor Courtyard, Cecconi's is a modern day classic Italian restaurant open for breakfast, lunch and dinner. Originating in Venice and with outposts in London and West Hollywood, Cecconi's has become a critically-acclaimed dining destination featuring simply prepared Venetian-inspired food. The restaurant design includes antique Nile green striped tile floors, graceful garden dining with Silver Buttonwood trees and a retractable awning for indoor/outdoor dining. Cecconi's offers an elegant and relaxed dining experience for both members and guests with celebrated executive chef Sergio Sigala at the helm.

Nobu (1901 Collins Avenue)

The Miami outpost of Chef Nobu Matsuhisa's new Japanese cuisine empire. Nobu draws upon his classical training at sushi bars in Tokyo and his life abroad in Peru, Argentina, and around the world to create a whole new trend in Japanese cuisine, bringing a burst of excitement to the already famed scene of Miami Beach. Nestled in the ultra chic Shore Club, Nobu adds a level of class and sophistication to the legendary nightlife spot. The white curtain enveloped Nobu Lounge is "the place to be seen" where locals, visitors, connoisseurs, and socialites convene. In the dining room Nobu's signature dishes such as Yellowtail with Jalapeno and Black Cod with Miso are served to throngs of fans, proving that in the end, it is all about the food.



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Prime 112

(112 Ocean Drive, Miami Beach, Florida 33139)

There's much more than just beef at this inventive New American steak house. Noncarnivores can also dine happily on creative "chef's composition" entrées featuring poultry or seafood (like wild salmon -- incomparably better than farmed fish -- with a lemon nage); or on meal-sized salads like the signature Prime 112 (romaine, spinach, cucumber, hearts of palm, celery, tomatoes, asparagus, and bacon chunks); or on coldwater oysters, and other pristine raw bar selections. That said, the prime dry-aged steaks are superb, and so are the sides diners can order à la carte. These upgraded versions of steak-house classics -- vibrantly green creamed spinach with crispy shallots, cornmeal-crust real onion rings, and the like -- plus unique creations like sweet potato and vanilla bean mash, are each well worth it. Warning: The atmospheric space, housed in Miami Beach's beautifully renovated first hotel, is wildly popular, so reserving weeks in advance is wisest, especially for the main dining room; there's seating upstairs, at the bar, and on an outdoor front porch too.

Prime Italian

(101 Ocean Drive Miami Beach, FL 33139)

This Italian sister to the stunningly successful Prime 112 succeeds as an all-purpose upscale dining venue. Patrons can begin by choosing from soups; salads; coal-oven pizzas; oysters; caviar; cocktails of shrimp, crab, or lobster; baked clams; fried bufala mozzarella; antipasti; and one big Kobe meatball with ricotta and a memorable marinara sauce. Entrées include the same selection and quality of char-grilled steaks as those at 112, plus seafoods, pastas, and classics such as hot and sweet sausages, shrimp scampi, lobster fra diavolo, eggplant parmigiana, and some two dozen à la carte sides, including a whole section devoted to spuds. There's also Sinatra over the speakers, white linens on the tables, fine wines in the delicate stemware, and attentive service to go along with the solidly prepared traditional Italian fare.

South Beach

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Burger & Beer Joint

(1766 Bay Rd. Miami Beach, FL 33139)

B&B is South Beach's local burger and beer bar that everyone's talking about. A combination including an energetic staff ready to serve mouth watering dishes, mixed with a full blown soda fountain serving up egg creams, shakes and adult beverages, sprinkled with a 10lb MAMMOTH burger creates the tri-fecta of B&B. The space features unique décor, boasting 120-year-old Chicago brick walls, wooden booths, copper ceilings and outdoor patios.



Pubbelly

(1418 20th St Miami Beach, FL 33139)

Pubbelly is the collaborated creation of Andreas Schreiner, Jose Mendin & Sergio Navarro. These 3 young entrepreneurs and hospitality professionals have joined forces to make their dream a reality, creating the first Asian-inspired Gastropub in Miami. Located in the western part of Miami Beach, this tavern like restaurant will feature true gastropub fare such as homemade pate's, duck and pork rillettes, specialty terrines, braised dishes, homemade sausages and pickled vegetables along with it's signature and innovative haute Asian street food. The beverage concept will compliment every aspect of the cuisine with a wine list focusing on boutique growers from Europe and the Americas. The beer list will change often offering customers a wide variety of specialty brews from Europe, Asia and the Americas that will satisfy any pallet. Having a strong Asian influence in the food allows Pubbelly to incorporate a unique sake program that is well balanced and specially sourced. Pubbelly will strive at providing guests with a relaxed, intimate and fun dining experience with intuitive yet natural service in one of the coolest tavern like pubs in Miami.

South Beach

Rosa Mexicano

(900 South Miami Avenue # 161 Miami, FL 33130)

The restaurant's design creates a festive environment with bold, vibrant colors and features a tortilla-making station in the dining room as well as a dynamic 15-foot water wall with a legion of Acapulco cliff diver figurines. The outdoor bar and lounge offers an oasis in the middle of downtown, complete with a front row seat to the emerging neighborhood's activity. Whether you're dining inside or out, the experience is exclusively Rosa Mexicano.



Casa Tua

(1700 James Ave Miami Beach, FL 3313)

This place is more famous for its beautiful—and overrated—restaurant. The five suites in the Mediterranean villa, on the other hand, are less widely known but altogether a better bet—provided you can snag one. Casa Tua now operates as a private club (Boris Becker and Elle Macpherson are among the founding set), and members get first dibs, so you must reserve as far in advance as possible. It's worth it. The owners, Michele and Leticia Grendene, have lavished extraordinary attention on the rooms, creating deluxe cocoons with overstuffed white sofas, four-poster beds, and lovely, unexpected details—Loro Piana cashmere throws, 200-year-old Chinese chests, '50s Italian chairs. Before you arrive, you fill out a personal amenity list so that your choice of Santa Maria de Novella toiletries is waiting in your glistening, white bathroom (you can buy them and plenty of other things around the house). You also choose grade of sheet, type of flower, scent of candle...it is, after all, "your house."

BOND ST

(150 20th Street Miami, FL 33139-1904)

The sleek sushi restaurant and lounge and South Beach outpost of the famed Manhattan sushi restaurant, has been lauded by Zagat Miami as having "the best sushi tuna on the planet" and "fabulously creative sushi," and is known for its health-conscious menu and some of the most memorable flavors in Miami. Famous house specialties include Chilean seabass skewers; spicy tuna rolls with chili mayonnaise; fresh sundried-tomato and avocado rolls with garlic ponzu oil and green tea salt; lobster tempura rolls with yellow tomato dressing and chive oil; and sesame crusted shrimp rolls with orange curry dijon.

RESTAURANTS

Midtown Miami

(this is a partial listing of all the restaurants in Midtown Miami area)

Wynwood Grille

(2550 N W 2nd Ave, Wynwood District)

This is for the adventurous, not because of the food (which is well priced, great eclectic quality contemporary American food), but, because this neighborhood is really in transition. It has a nice outdoor area and a good hip local crowd. Not many tourists are seen in this hood.

Buena Vista

(4582 NE 2nd Ave, Design district) - This restaurant is urban Miami meets French bistro. The food is great. The price point is good and the service is better than anywhere in Paris or Miami.

Mandolin

(4314 Northeast 2nd Avenue, Design District)

Just across the bridge from the Fontainebleau in the Design District you will find a little Greek Island Taverna. Set in a 1940's house with a back garden - white-washed building with blue trimmed windows, brimming with bougainvillea, sitting in vintage traditional taverna chairs at wooden tables, under a lantern-lit tree. The grilled octopus and the fresh fish are fantastic.

Senora Martinez

(4000 N.E. 2nd Ave, Design District)

Miami celebrity-chef Michelle Bernstein brings her culinary talents to the Miami Design District at Senora Martinez. Enjoy Tapas and cocktails at this historic locale. Try the Egg Carpaccio - named "Best Thing I ever Ate" by Food Network.

Michaels Genuine

(130 Northeast 40th Street, Design District)

For foodies, this is probably the best restaurant in Miami. (you definitely need a reservation). The menus change daily because they start with what's in season. The brick oven anything is a must.
