Dear Colleague,

The American Bar Association (ABA) Section of Antitrust Law and the International Bar Association (IBA) are pleased to invite you to the Ninth International Cartel Workshop, which will be held in Vancouver, Canada during February 1-3, 2012. The International Cartel Workshop, recognized globally as the premier international cartel program, is presented only once every two years. Following the successful 2010 program in Paris, the workshop returns to North America in 2012. We are delighted that Canada will host this widely acclaimed program for the first time.

The 2012 program will continue the Workshop's tradition of instruction by demonstration, with a faculty of 75 highly experienced attorneys from around the globe taking you inside a hypothetical international cartel matter -- from detection by government enforcers to the disposition of government prosecutions and private damage claims. GETTING AROUND

Transportation options available from the Vancouver International Airport

Canada Line Skytrain

The Canada Line Skytrain (light rapid transit system) departs every 12 minutes (every 6 minutes during peak periods) to downtown Vancouver. The current fare is \$8.75 per person and will take you to Vancouver City Centre Station which is 2 blocks away from the hotel. The trip will take 30 minutes and is recommended for guests with little luggage.

Taxi

Taxis are readily available at the Arrivals Level. The trip will take 30 minutes and the cost is a metered rate of approximately \$30.00 - \$35.00. There is also an "Aerocar" limousine stand in the same area which offers sedan cars to our hotel for approximately \$45.00 - \$50.00 but they do not take advance reservations.

Private Car

The concierge desk at the hotel can arrange a private car and driver for a cost of approximately \$145.00. For the private transfer, the driver will be inside the airport with a sign and will assist with luggage. The concierge would simply require the flight information and a credit card to confirm the car. There would be a 24 hour cancellation for this service.

Parking

- The hotel's parking facility is adjacent to the hotel and is underground.
- Valet Parking is \$32.00 CAD/night + applicable taxes, including in-and-out privileges
- Self Parking is \$30.00 CAD/night + applicable taxes, including in-and-out privileges
- Visitors may also use the street parking for a maximum time of two hours. It is metered from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., seven days a week.
